Graduate Center Community Updates

Double Victory! Reclaim the Commons has successfully pressured GC Management to reopen the cafeteria and open a food pantry by Fall 2023. This is a huge win and demonstrates the power of our collective direct action.

Reclaim the Commons demands:

- 1. The operations of the cafeteria and pantry must be transparent and include community consultation and governance.
 - **a.** A timeline for pantry and food service reopening must be provided, with regular updates.
 - **b.** All partnerships and funding sources must be disclosed and communicated.
 - **c.** The GC Community, including students, faculty, and staff, must be involved in all decision-making.



2. The reopening of the cafeteria must not conflict with the use of the dining commons as a community space.

a. The Commons is now a community space, autonomously run by the people for the people, and not for profit. The cafeteria must accommodate this fact.

3. The cafeteria and pantry must provide accessible, affordable, high-quality food.

- **a.** Food must be fresh, clearly label nutritional contents (i.e. low sodium, low cholesterol), and meet various dietary restrictions (i.e. kosher, halal, vegetarian, vegan, gluten-free).
- **b.** Cafeteria services must include affordable hot lunch options that do not exceed \$10.
- **c.** Access to the pantry must not be limited. Need is need.
- **d.** The pantry must have immediately consumable items and this must never consist of day-old items from the cafeteria.
- **e.** Staple goods in the pantry must be accompanied by recipes of no more than 9 ingredients that require basic cooking tools and are easy to follow.

4. The pantry must be a People's Pantry - accessible to all.

- **a.** The pantry space must be unlocked at all times, and accessible whenever the building is open.
- **b.** Zero red tape. The GC Community should be able to freely access food without being surveilled and without giving personal details. Any tracking must be based on usage rather than user data.

As we maintain focus on food access and democratizing space, we also recognize a larger ecosystem of Graduate Center needs. Instead of being siloed from each other, we welcome all GC students, faculty, and staff—across the DGSC, Graduate Council, and PSC—to address these issues (and more!) together:

- No Confidence in GC Upper Admins
- Expand Childcare Center hours and affordability
- Fix the Budget Office

- Freeze rent and utilities costs for GC student and faculty housing
- Fair and fully funded union contracts
- CUNY for Abortion Rights demands
